

## HEMP – My favorite cooking appliance



My favorite cooking gadget I used in America a year in 1982 to 1983 when driving around from state to state was the one you see on the picture.

It can run on alcohol, gasoline, diesel or kerosene. The kerosene is the most effective fuel, and close to that comes the diesel. The gasoline is easier to ignite and the alcohol is not producing much warmth.

You can fill the tank  $\frac{3}{4}$  and pump some air in. You open for the liquid about 10 seconds and put a match to it. If it is gasoline the liquid will soon turn into vapor and open again for the fuel. Your dinner is soon cooking.

A 10 liter Jerrycan can last you a month or a family 14 days, so have a lot of Jerrycans with gasoline or diesel.

Instead of driving around in a car that works for a week or two before the fuel is gone, save the fuel for cooking. You could be cooking for a whole year and use bicycle or horse to come around for ever.

If you ever determine problems with the cooking, open for the air to come out. If it has caught fire, then put on gloves and bring it outdoors. I used the cooker in for one month in Sweden in 2005. A storm had taken millions of trees down and the trees near wires was taken down. About 1 million were without current. Some people had generators or borrowed some generators from the fire department.



Those who have a stove for firewood are lucky. They used that just a 100 years ago. They boiled water, cooked and baked on it. This stove used to be in the kitchen, but is now installed in the cellar.
